Region 1 Report

First, I'd like to thank District Governor Jim for the confidence in me by asking me to be the Region 1 Chair. There are 12 clubs in the region which encompasses all of New Castle County.

Unfortunately, only 2/3 (8 out of 12) of the clubs in the region have reported any service activities so far this year. Considering that I think the remaining clubs have started the year off great. The 8 clubs reporting have reported 1, 987 service activity hours and donations of \$41,554.

Some of the clubs have been busy fundraising and several are selling the Car Raffle Tickets for the Milford Lions Club. Two of the clubs, Claymont and Talleyville-Naamans, partnered together doing white cane days in late September.

Eye Glasses are being recycled, Vision Screenings are being done and Eye Exams and Glasses are being provided to those needing the assistance. Scholarships are being awarded and clubs are gearing up for the Peace Poster Contest.

One club is already actively supporting the Special Olympics. Two of the clubs have some of their members doing the phone surveys for LOVRNET.

Upcoming fundraisers in the region include Claymont's Pancake Breakfast on October 31st and Brookside is having a Beef & Beer Fundraiser for Leader Dog on November 14th. New Castle Hundred is sponsoring a Halloween Parade on October 30th.

Now, for Membership in the Region; I am happy to report membership is up by 2!! Delaware City and Wilmington Manor have each inducted 1 new member and New Castle Hundred has inducted 2 new members.

Each Zone has had a successful Zone Meeting and the Region is having a Region Meeting on November 12th instead of each of the Zones having an individual meeting.

Work has already started on the Region 1 Christmas Party for the Blind and Visually Impaired to be held on December 12th in the auditorium at Wilmington College. Approximately 675 Invitations were mailed earlier this week by BlindSight. We have Entertainment and a duo for Master of Ceremonies.

LCIF/LOVRNET Report

The LOVRNET continues to be put together by the LOVRNET Steering Committee. The Lion volunteers who are interviewers have done over 200 interviews this year. LOVRNET still needs more interviewers; just contact PDG Richard Merriwether or me to volunteer. Lion Lloyd Schmitz, who you all know is blind, has volunteered as an interviewer and is now fully certified to do interviews.

Lions Quest Report

Thank you Governor Jim for this assignment of introducing and installing the Lions Quest program in the State Education and corrections systems.

How many of you are familiar with the Lions Quest program and what it is aimed to accomplish? Raise your hand ---or nod your head --- Thank you.

What? Lions Quest is a Pre K-12 Social and Emotional Learning (SEL) program used by educators in over 90 countries around the world. Quest meets.

Social and emotional skills provide the foundation for dealing with anger and frustration, preventing negative behaviors, and developing positive school behaviors that increase academic performance. What are the SEL components?

Positive Behavior – Connection to school – Anti-bullying –Service Learning –Drug, alcohol and tobacco awareness – Character Education – Service Learning by connecting school, parents and the community.

Implementing the Quest program has its cost for staff training and materials necessary for success. LCI will provide grants for the instruction if there are enough teachers and staff to make a workshop feasible. When we compare our cost for each student in Delaware to the SEED DC program in Washington, DC, our cost is minimal. The SEED DC has the 350 students housed in a \$25 million dorm with an annual cost of \$35,000 per student; however, 69% of the graduates attend college.

Two members of our Quest team are ZC Bill Walls, an active judge in the state who works with students that failed to become good citizens. Lion Daniel Young from the Clayton Club is a former Parent Educator for Children and Families with 16 years counselling experience.

Wrap – The skills learned through Quest are applicable to all students. According to the data when a school starts the Quest program, success builds in the classroom, teachers are happier, parents and community become a team.
