When the Multiple District 22 Lions, Lioness and Leo's meet in Hagerstown, Maryland May 16 to the 19th, they will have the honor of hosting International President Dr. Jitsuhiro Yamada from Japan.

President Yamada will be the key note speaker at the Tuesday night banquet, in addition to participating in the presentation of his awards and inducting new members. During the convention he will attend the Melvin Jones Luncheon, providing an LCIF update and participating in awards to key supporters of LCIF.

Convention attendees will have an opportunity to meet President Yamada during an open discussion session with members of the Lions International Family, especially Club Presidents, Family and Women Members and have a photo taken with him. He will also participate in the Lions Memorial Service being held on Wednesday May 18th.

IP Dr. Yamada

Dr. Yamada of Minokamo, Gifu, Japan, was elected to serve as President of Lions Clubs International at the 98th International Convention held in Honolulu, last June.

President Yamada is a neurosurgeon.

A member of the Minokamo Lions Club, President Yamada has been a Lion since 1985. He has held many offices in the association, including District Governor and GLT constitutional area vice leader. He served on the International Board from 2005 to 2007 as a member of the Executive Committee and the Long Range Planning Committee and Vice Chairperson of the Convention Committee. He also served as a board appointee for 2011-12.

In recognition of his service to the association, President Yamada has received numerous awards, including the Humanitarian Partner Award, 10 International Presidents Awards and Ambassador of Good Will Award, the highest honor the association bestows upon its members. He is also a Progressive Melvin Jones Fellow.

In addition to his Lions activities, President Yamada is chairperson for several organizations including the Social Medical Corporation Koseikai, the Kizawa Memorial Hospital, the Social Welfare Corporation Jikeikai, Nozominooka Hospital and Ajisai Nursing College. He is standing director of the Japan Hospital Association and an affiliate professor at Gifu University.

President Yamada has been active in the area of international relations, serving as president of the Gifu-Hungary Friendship Association, Gifu Morocco Association and Gifu-Salzburg association. He is recipient of the Order of Merit of the Republic of Hungry, the Medal of Honor of the Alaouite Dynasty of the Kingdom of Morocco and an honorary citizen of Beijing City, China, in recognition of his service to international friendship building.

President Yamada and his wife, Dr. Toshiko Yamada, also a Lion and Progressive Melvin Jones Fellow, have one son, one daughter and three grandchildren.





Active Shooter Awareness

The WAVE just reported that our local police department recently trained to be prepared in the event of an active shooter call. Being proactive it very responsible, being not prepared is inexcusable. Organizations like the Lions that have regular meetings in small groups or convention size gatherings need to address this concern to provide information that can save lives. Let's take a few minutes to think about what we would do if faced with an active shooter.

Below is information taken from a Department of Homeland Security pamphlet.

An "active shooter" is an individual who is engaged in killing or attempting to kill people in a confined and populated area; in most cases, active shooters use firearms and there is no pattern or method to their selection of victims.

Victims are selected at random Event is unpredictable and evolves quickly Knowing what to do can save lives

When an Active Shooter is in your vicinity, you must be prepared both mentally and physically to deal with the situation.

You have three options:

1 RUN

Have an escape route and plan in mind

Leave your belongings behind

Evacuate regardless of whether others agree to follow

Help others escape, if possible

Do not attempt to move the wounded

Prevent others from entering an area where the active shooter may be

Keep your hands visible

Call 911 when you are safe

2 HIDE

Hide in an area out of the shooter's view

Lock door or block entry to your hiding place

Silence your cell phone (including vibrate mode) and remain quiet

3 FIGHT

Fight as a last resort and only when your life is in imminent danger

Attempt to incapacitate the shooter

Act with as much physical aggression as possible

Improvise weapons or throw items at the active shooter

Commit to your actions . . . your life depends on it







Lord Baltimore Lions Club celebrates 70 years of service

It's hard to go anywhere in the Ocean View area without seeing an as-pect of the community that the Lord Baltimore Lions Club has touched.

In the 70 years since the club was formed — initially from staff and ad-ministration at the Lord Baltimore School - members have worked to improve the lives of others through projects ranging from providing glasses to those who need them but cannot afford them to building a house for a family in

Many are familiar with the Lions Clubs' assistance with eyeglasses and other issues involving eyesight, but few know where the connection began.

Club President Karl Gude s Helen Keller spoke to a national Lions group in 1925, challenging members to help those who could not see. "She challenged them to be 'knights of the blind," he said. More than two decades later, on Jan.

23, 1946, the first Lord Baltimore club members signed its charter. Although none of the original 30 members origial are still living, Gude said member Harry Dukes Jr. is the grandson of a founding member. He said at least three current members — Bill Scott, Kenny Crooks and Bobby Jones — have been

members for more than 50 years. The group first met at the school it-elf, and at Mariner's Bethel United Methodist Church, Meeting places over Methodist Church. Meeting places over the years reflect popular eateries in the history of the area: Murray's Topside on the Indian River Bay in Cedar Neck and the Holiday House on the board-

walk in Bethany Beach, among others.

In the years following, the club took root in the community. In addition t services for the vision-impaired, the club has branched out to reach others in need. Providing medical equipment for community members has been a partic-

ularly rewarding and successful en-deavor, Gude said. "If you need a hospital bed, if you need a walker, the Lions Chib will provide it," he said, noting that they w even deliver the equipment and pick it up again when it is no longer needed. That program has been so successful, Gude said, that the club often has more

medical equipment than it can identify a need for. So the club works with a fellow Lion upstate who takes the surplus equipment and distributes it throughout

A major component of the Lion son internationally, Gude said, is

mission internationary, Court of feeding the hungry.

"We realize that people are not only hungry at Thanksgiving and Christmas," he said. The Lord Baltimore Club mas, "he said. The Lord Baltimore Club mas," he said. has recently partnered with the SOUL Ministries homeless shelter in Be Beach, he added.

to see change in his Lions Club, he said it would be for its membership to grow beyond its 60 current members. He recognized that his group is in a unique position because of its location in the midst of an area heavily populated by retirees and "retirees are always looking for something to do."

Gude encouraged younger folks to join the ranks, since they are the future of the community and of the club, and he admitted that he would like to a more members step up into leadership roles. He emphasized that the club changes those who join it, forming within them a sense of their own pur

"You join the Lions Club and you

The Lord Baltimore Lions' three largest fundraisers continue to be its fried chicken sales, its fruit sales and its annual car raffle. Even after 70 years, Gude said, the club continues to thrive

We are still a strong, vibrant club." The Lord Baltimore Lions Club eets on the first and third Wednesdays of each month, except July and August, when they meet on the first Wednesday only.
