



Over 48,000 Americans have their sight restored each year as a result of corneal transplants. Lions Eye Bank of Delaware Valley and its 82 sister eye banks across the country, provide the tissue that makes these life-enhancing procedures possible.

First proclaimed by President Ronald Reagan in 1983, National Eye Donor Month promotes eye donation awareness and celebrates the lives of eye donors and corneal recipients.

Serving the Delaware Valley community, the Eye Bank works 365 days a year to provide residents with the highest quality and safest corneal tissue available. There is no substitute for human tissue. The transplantation process depends upon the precious gift of cornea donation from one human to another. The function of corneal tissue is not dependent on blood type, age, strength of eyesight or the color of the eye.

Individuals interested in eye, tissue, or organ donation should access their state registry through Lions Eye Bank of Delaware Valley's website at www.lebdv.org; donor designation can also be made through state entities such as your department of motor vehicles.



Lions Ramp Up Community Service

When Mike Mock dials his fellow Lions Club members and asks them, on short notice, to put in a day of manual labor, he's certain he'll get a good turnout.

After all, the Milton resident knows the willingness of coastal Sussex County Lions to help others

> Bill Fisher says when Mock calls, he just asks what time he should be there. That's the general reaction of the nearly dozen men and one woman - Mock's wife, Doris - who volunteer their time to build and install wheelchair ramps for disabled residents. The core group represents

Lions from the Midway, Rehoboth Beach, Lewes, Dewey Beach and Milton clubs, and has installed at least 77 ramps since the initiative began several years ago.

On a chilly morning this winter, about 10 volunteers gathered in Long Neck to measure and cut wood, nail ramp sections togeth-

er and dig out and grade the approach. For people unable to manage stairs, the structures literally open doors and create access they haven't had in years.

Fisher, a member of the Milton group for so long he can't remember exactly when he joined. recalls a woman who hadn't been out of her house in two years: "You say, 'Wow, this is all worth it for me.' It's a great group of guys here that get together and try to help somebody. That's what it's all about."

Part of the international service organization founded almost a century ago, coastal Sussex Lions also sponsor eye screenings for children and help host a Christmas party for the county's visually impaired. In addition to those regional (or zone) endeavors, chapters take on individual projects. For instance, the Milton club for the past 10 years has provided Christmas food baskets to needy families, donated money to help the Casa San Francisco homeless shelter purchase food, clothing, blankets and other items, and led the ramp-building work.

As for the latter, Mock says they take donated materials, but keep an eye out for wood that looks nice when the product is finished. "We try not to put an ugly board in it," he says. "We're proud of the work [our volunteers] do."


