#### MAJOR PRIVATE DONATION TO PURCHASE SCREENING DEVICE

On August 21<sup>st</sup> Region 2, Zone 1 held its first Zone Meeting. Leftover from last year's unfinished business was whether or not the Zone wanted to purchase a new Preschool screening device. A demonstration of the new PlusOptix was given, by PCC Clyde Bragg. He also shared, with the zone members, the pros and cons of the new device compared to the older SureSight.

The cost of the PlusOptix is \$5875, lowered to \$4875 if the SureSight device is traded in. It was discussed that in all likelihood the Delaware Lions Foundation would match funds we could collect from the clubs in the zone. This would still leave a bit more than \$2400 to be divided by the six clubs in the zone (including the Dover Lioness Club). At \$400 per club, this was more than most of the clubs could afford, which would leave an undue burden on the few clubs who had money in their budgets earmarked for preschool vision screening.

A solution to this budgetary problem was reached when Lions Kate and Walt Roshon of the Clayton Lions Club graciously offered to donate a whopping \$2000 towards the purchase of the PlusOptix screening device. This left the remainder within easy reach of the clubs who could afford to participate in this purchase. A motion was made and passed to purchase the machine, hopefully before the next Zone Meeting.

The members of the clubs in the zone who were in attendance were overwhelmed at the generosity of Lions Kate and Walt. Without their help, it would have been nearly impossible to update our screening program. The Pride is surely strengthened by their commitment to this program.

#### 2014 USA/CANADA LIONS LEADERSHIP FORUM

This year's Forum was held in *beautiful* Puerto Rico. The number of Seminars was increased to include a few held on the first day.

We had 22 members from 22D attending!

# Leader Dog News



Dear Fellow Lions,

Seventy-five years ago, Leader Dog was founded by three Detroit-area Lions club members. Working together, the Lions family and Leader Dog team have changed the lives of more than 14,500 blind or visually impaired clients worldwide.

The process starts in the Leader Dog kennel in Rochester Hills, Michigan. It is here that the Leader Dog team breeds future Leader Dogs, cares for young puppies and prepares the dogs for lifelong partnerships with people who are blind. Lions are an integral and invaluable part serving as breeding host families, puppy raisers, donors and advocates for the program.

The kennels are a key component to the Leader Dog program. The newest facility, built in 1992 (and the oldest in 1968) no longer meets today's needs. The last 20 years have witnessed dramatic changes in breeding techniques, the type of dog needed for clients, the kenneling environment and training techniques. Leader Dogs for the Blind has created a redesign of the kennel into a Canine Development Center--a critical component to meet current and future mission needs.

Just as Lions did 75 years ago, once again we will play a key role. Leader Dog needs our support to fund this project. Success depends on our committed leadership and involvement, and yet, we must continue to promote Leader Dog's mission and strengthen our community-based outreach and referral efforts.

Through our participation as Lions in Leader Dog's campaign, we have the power to continue to make a difference as we have for 75 years. It all begins with you.




#### **Pike Creek Hockessin Lions**

#### LOVERNET

Fellow Lions.

The Lions Low Vision Rehabilitation Network (LOVRNET) is about to go into high gear. The first aspect of the program is to have trained and certified Lion interviewers make calls to referred low vision patients and interview them. To become a trained and certified LOVRNET interviewer, a Lion is required to take a Health Insurance Portability & Accountability Act (HIPAA) certification exam and also a course provided by the LOVRNET office. Both will be available on the Internet. Once certified, a Lion will be on the list to receive referrals of low vision patients who qualify for rehabilitative care. The calls will be made from home. Questions to be asked the patient are provided via the Internet and will appear on the Lion's home computer screen. The interviews take about an hour, or perhaps a bit longer. (Sometimes the patient may want to spend some time explaining certain problems, which will extend the time.)

Certified LOVRNET interviewers are expected to be computer literate, have a pleasant telephone personality, and be empathetic with patients. Since the calls will be made from home, prospective interviewers need a home computer and telephone.

As chairman of the Low Vision Patient Interview Program, I seek to enlist 20 willing Lions per sub-District, with a goal of 100 certified LOVRNET Interviewers. The number of referrals in the first year is expected to be very high, and each interviewer may expect to make about 20 calls per month.

If you are willing to volunteer, please let me know and we will arrange for you to take the HIPAA compliance course via your home computer as soon as possible. The course takes about 30 minutes. Ted Ladd, PDG

## Blowing the Whistle for 22D


#### Hi
